A Message from our Locum Minister Rev Susan Galloway

The Gift

A wealthy man and his son loved to collect rare art works and had everything from Picasso to Raphael. A war broke out and the young man was drafted and later died in battle rescuing another soldier. His father grieved deeply over the loss of his son. One night there was a knock on the door. A young soldier stood

outside with a package in his hands. He told the father, "I'm the man your son died to save. He often talked about you and how you both loved fine art." The package was a painting of his son done by the soldier. "I'm not an artist, but I wanted you to have this."

The father took the portrait of his son and hung it in pride of place above the fireplace. Every time someone came to the house, he showed them this painting first.

When the man died, an auction was organised to sell the works of art in his collection.

On the day of the auction the portrait of the man's son was the first item to be shown to the crowd. The auctioneer asked, "Who will bid on the son?" The room was silent because no one wanted this picture. What the people wanted was the famous pictures they'd come for. The auctioneer asked again "Who will bid on the son."

Finally, a voice said, "I'll give you £10 for it." It was the family gardener, and he didn't have much money. The auctioneer said "I have £10 bid, who will give me £20?" The people were furious and shouted for the famous paintings. The auctioneer banged his gavel, "Going once, going twice, sold to the man in the back for £10."

The auctioneer then stepped down saying that the auction was over and that due to a secret stipulation in the will the person who bought the son was to receive the entire collection as well.

This simple story made me think that, although Jesus was a million times more precious to God than this man's picture of his son, God was willing to sacrifice his son so that all of us might be forgiven and free.

It says in John 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life."

Imagine the truth of that for a moment. You are valuable enough to God that He put his Son through humiliation ... torment ... pain ... heartbreak and death. The one who created the earth, and the stars loves the same people that spat in his son's face and rejected his kindness.

Many times, in our society, people are told that they're expendable, that they're worthless. God disagrees. He has said that he loves you enough to give up his only son for you. That makes YOU extremely valuable!

May you be blessed in your life by knowing and feeling God with you.

He had been tasked with clearing the BB cupboard of the former 7th Edinburgh at Dreghorn Loan hall and wondered if I would like to see if there was anything we could make use of. To cut a long story short, Calum and I hired a van and collected a variety of items for use by the 65th and further afield. The equipment collected is as follows:-

- ◆ Two table tennis tables and assorted equipment—now in the Gibson Craig Halls (GCH) for use by the 65th. We also intend hosting a table tennis competition for all members of the Edinburgh Leith and District Battalion. Further opportunities to utilise the tables in the community is also being considered.
- Two junior basketball stands are in the GCH and will be used by the Anchors and Juniors enhancing their programme.
- A variety of balls will be used by all members of the 65th.
- Two sets of Unihok and a number of badminton racquets will be offered free to any organisation who can use them.
- A number of bugles will find their way to BB Guyana through the Global Fellowship of Christian Faith.

Our grateful thanks are due to our neighbours Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church for this equipment which I am sure will be well used at Currie Kirk.

My thanks are also due to Shona Moyes and Charity Crafters for their kind donation of £100 to the 65th. This cash will be used by the Junior Section for the purchase of craft materials something the Boys do as part of their weekly programme.

Around with World in 70 years

id any of you watch the Michael Palin's TV programme, "Full Circle" where on the extreme southern edge of Chile, near Cape Horn, he visited a small wood-hewn chapel where from one window he could see the Pacific and from the other window, the Atlantic Ocean?

Seeing him in that place, my memory travelled back over the years to some of the places of worship I had attended and prayed. A small clinical Gospel Hall in Fisherrow - a tiny Magdalene Mission in Musselburgh where with our teacher friend Lorna Hutchison a crowd of lads gathered to have fun but also to meet the Lord. The beautiful St Margaret's Chapel in Edinburgh Castle; the massive St Andrew's Halls in Glasgow at a youth gathering; a wooden mission hut of the Mission to Seamen in Argentine; the grandeur of Westminster and St Paul's Cathedral in London; a colourful Salvation Army Citadel in Hong Kong; and the crowded moving Billy Graham rallies in both Tynecastle and Murrayfield Stadiums spanning 40 years.

On holiday two years ago with my wife Elizabeth where we worshipped in the fairly austere surroundings of the Church of Scotland St Andrew's Church in Rome and on the following Sunday in the majestic gold and marble of St Mark's Cathedral in Venice. The welcoming solid stone of the parish church in Stornoway where they have no organ to accompany the hymn singing: the white painted St Andrew's Cathedral in steamy Singapore to the beautifully painted Orkney chapel built during the Second World War by Italian prisoners.

So on around the world and in many places and climes I have paused, worshipped and prayed and come close to God. My fondest recollection among those and many others, too numerous to mention? I am not sure, but one occasion which comes close must surely be when, as a Boy Scout, and camping with our troop in the borders we held a service in one of the tents on a calm summer evening so many years ago. The truth is, God is everywhere. In a massive cathedral, a small tent, a forest clearing, a crowded bus or in your own room. We can speak to Him anywhere and if we listen, He will speak to us. Why not have a chat with Him wherever you are?

Coming Soon—Every Saturday, Currie Kirk, Kirkgate


