FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Trustees' present the Annual Report and Accounts for Currie Kirk for the year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Church's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

Objectives and activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every Parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

In serving an ecclesiastic parish of 9,500 people, our Objectivities and Activities are anchored in our Mission Statement: 'Currie Kirk – Where Faith and Life Cross Paths'. In practical terms this is lived out in a variety of ways including worship, engagement with the community through various groups, and outreach to the wider world.

The Demission of the Full Time Parish Minister in September 2023 has had an obvious impact on some activities.

Under the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian Mission Plan, the Congregation of Currie Kirk will unite with the Congregation of Balerno Parish Church to form one administrative and governance unit under the care of one Parish Minister. All Church and Hall buildings currently held by the two Congregations will be retained. Negotiations towards this union are ongoing. Meantime the Congregation continues most of its activities under the guidance of an Interim Moderator and a Locum Minister.

Worship

In worship, our aim is to share the good news of God's love, revealed through the ministry of Jesus Christ, vibrantly present in the Spirit. Our services, held at 10.30am each Sunday, seek to meet people where they are in their own faith journey. We also provide worship opportunities for the frail and isolated in our community. For those congregants the services are delivered every week on CD recordings.

Outreach to the Community

We regard outreach to the local community as an important part of church life, enabling us to engage with many people who have no other contact with the church. The **Gibson Craig Halls** are owned and run by the church and locally regarded as the 'village hall'. Centrally situated, the halls are widely used by local organisations ranging from Pilates and amateur dramatics to Zumba and one-off functions like birthday parties and anniversary events.

Outreach to the Wider World

The Kirk promotes and supports charitable causes at home and abroad including Christian Aid, Fair Trade, Bethany Christian Trust, Edinburgh Direct Aid, Fresh Start, Community Food Projects at Juniper Green and Holy Trinity Centre Foodbank in Wester Hailes. It also held retiral offerings at Easter and Christmas for Bethany a homeless charity and FACE an NHS Lothian Charity which supports cancer patients.

Achievements and performance

Worship

Worship is at the heart of the Kirk's life together and it provides the opportunity for a number of different types of service as it reaches out to the various constituent elements of the membership and the community.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Prayer Group

During Lent 2024 a joint group from Currie Kirk and Balerno Parish Church met together exploring personal prayer. Arising from this a new reflective Prayer Group, known as 'Soul Mates' was established. The Group meets monthly and there has been a encouraging increase in participants in recent months.

The Prayer Covenant Group offers confidential intercessory prayer for individuals and issues on request.

A **Prayer Tree** service is held once a month after morning worship. A Prayer Tree is situated in the Link Building where names can be added for prayer.

Food Bank

During Lent and at other times members contributed to the local Food Banks in Wester Hailes and Juniper Green. At Easter the Congregation, The Boys' Brigade and Guild collected and delivered Easter eggs to Holy Trinity Church to be distributed to children who would otherwise not receive one. Christmas Advent Calendars and selection boxes were also donated. Thanks are due to the Guild, members of the Congregation and The Boys' Brigade for help with this.

Flower Ministry

A team of five flower arrangers along with ten volunteers provide arrangements for later delivery each Sunday to deliver flowers each Sunday to the elderly and those recovering from illness. This ministry is very much appreciated by those who receive the flowers.

Pastoral Care

The three teams of Pastoral Carers continue to do invaluable work. Each team, with its own leader, are responsible for the care of several of the Congregation. The Guild is proactive in providing pastoral care to its members.

Blythswood Shoebox Appeal: Currie Kirk organised the Shoebox Appeal this year and handed over **64** completed shoeboxes, along with two large boxes of extra items to Blythswood. These shoeboxes were destined for Ukraine.

Care Van and Welcome Centre: Currie Kirk continues to support the Night Shelter by cooking for one or two nights during the winter months. Due to upper age restrictions, the Kirk is no longer able to take its turn on the nightly Care Van rota.

Celebration Weekend 2024: This type of event is popular with churches in Church of Scotland before they link or become a Union with another church. The Congregation was asked to submit photographs of memories from Currie and the Kirk, the Mission, Outreach and Fellowship (MOF) committee then created and displayed boards around the Gibson Craig Hall which proved very popular. Entertainment was provided for the families on the Saturday afternoon, followed by tea and a ceilidh. On the Sunday, The Rev Dr Anne T Logan led the service of celebration, followed by a soup lunch and afternoon service for those who could not attend the morning service.

Remembrance Weekend: In 2024 a remembrance garden and a book, giving all the details of those names on the war memorials inside Currie Kirk, was created. The book is still available to be read and is situated in the Link Building. After worship on Armistice Day, with The Boys' Brigade providing the colour party, wreaths were laid at the War Memorial outside Currie Kirk on behalf of Currie Kirk, the Scottish Government the Community Council and the Masonic Lodge. A wreath from Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church was laid later.

Christmas 2024: Over 900 mini stockings were made and filled with a tasty treat and attached to a Christmas card from Currie Kirk. Rev Susan Galloway delivered these to the local primary schools and nurseries.

Christmas Fayre: A very successful Christmas Fayre was held in the Gibson Craig Halls incorporating the usual stalls; the Guide Hall (which is situated to the rear of the Halls) was transformed into a Tinsel Tearoom. There was a children's area set aside with painting, crafts, and other fun Christmas activities.

Christingle: As part of the service on Christmas Eve a nativity play was performed with many children coming along from the community taking part.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

Messy Church: The Rev Susan Galloway enabled the Congregation to return to engagement with children through Messy Church.

Fresh Start: The community of Currie and the Kirk continues to support Fresh Start. Volunteers from the Kirk deliver donations weekly to its warehouse in Edinburgh.

Coffee Stop!

From May to September 2024, the MOF committee opened a café in the social area of Currie Kirk on a Saturday afternoon. It was well attended each week with members, walkers and visitors who saw the sign! This café will open again in 2025.

Communication

As part of the Kirk's social media strategy, the website has been revamped and is updated regularly. The Kirk has a presence on Facebook and this has enabled it to engage with the wider community and raise the profile of Currie Kirk. Currie Kirk's Interim Moderator has commenced a weekly letter to all members of the congregation.

Safeguarding

The number of registrations remains at 17. In terms of training, members are periodically reminded that training is mandatory and records of training completion are noted and updated in the PVG congregational register, which is presented to the Presbytery of Edinburgh on an annual basis.

Property

All essential work has been carried out, including roof repairs and routine maintenance. All properties are in good condition as a result.

Membership

The membership roll at 31st December, 2024 is 374. During the year two people joined by profession of faith and one by Resolution of the Kirk Session and four by Certificate of Transference, one transferred out; and there were 17 deaths. Various groups within, or associated with, the church continued to attract good support.

The Guild

Currie Kirk Guild has continued to meet fortnightly from January to April then from September to December. There is a high turnout of members at all meetings. A wide variety of speakers have been made welcome and their talks have been extremely interesting and informative. Main fundraising activities were the Daffodil Tea in March which raised £661 for "Beat Eating Disorders" and the Coffee Morning in October which raised £613 for "The Vine Trust". In addition, the Guild has donated Advent Calendars and Easter Eggs to the Holy Trinity Foodbank. Packets of instant mash and custard were also donated to supplement Christmas Dinner packs. The annual outing in May was to The Great Tapestry of Scotland then on to Melrose where the members enjoyed a meal together. As well as Guild members there were also friends of Guild members and members of Balerno Guild. The year ended with the Guild Christmas Party at which Mackenzie's provided a delicious meal ending the evening with a quiz and singing Christmas carols and songs together. It was a delightful way to end the year.

Organisation- 65th Edinburgh Company Boys' Brigade - Annual Report

65th Edinburgh (Currie) Company The Boys' Brigade

The Company currently runs three sections, Anchors (P2 and 3), Junior Section (P4 - 6) and Company Section (P7 - S6/18). All sections meet in the Gibson Craig Halls.

Anchor and Junior Sections

Anchor and Junior Sections meet on Thursday evenings from 6.00pm - 7.30pm. There are two members of staff, Diane Brown who has over 30 years' experience as an officer and Joanne Ormiston with over 10 years. The year started with 14 boys (6 Anchors and 8 Juniors). In May, five third year Juniors were promoted to the Company Section. Recruitment leaflets were offered to the various feeder schools with little or no response and the two sections finished the year with 8 boys (3 Anchors and 5 Juniors).

The Boys have grown bulbs, taken part in the Shoebox appeal, collected chocolate Advent Calendars and Easter eggs for the local food bank, made bird feeders and taken part in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch. The Boys attended the Battalion film outing to the cinema in December and enjoyed a Hawaiian Theme night making garlands and fruit kebabs. The Boys also took part in fundraisers which added over £300 to funds.

Company Section

The Company Section meets on Sundays from 6.30 - 8.30pm. A club/games night also takes place on Fridays from 7.00 - 8.30pm with badminton, table tennis, pool, table football and other activities on offer. The Company has three staff. Bill Brown, an officer for over 50 years is the Company Captain. He is supported by two young officers Dan Mackenzie and Duncan Cameron who have both come up through the 65th. In 2024, one boy, Connor McGill gained his Queen's Badge and Tony Cheung gained his President's Badge. One boy was discharged having reached the age limit but with five being promoted from the Junior Section it was hoped that they would augment the three remaining boys.

The Company again entered National competitions in table tennis and chess. The Boys and Staff attended the Battalion Christmas meal to Cosmo Restaurant in December and enjoyed a night 10 pin bowling. The Boys and Staff once again paraded the colours at the annual Remembrance Sunday service.

Once again well done to the Boys of all three Sections for their efforts and commitment. Huge thanks to the Staff for their time given freely and to the Kirk Session and Congregation for their continued support.

Financial review

The Accounts show that overall the net funds have increased through 2024 by £2,808; the comparable figure in 2023 was an decrease of £12,610.

At the end of the year the Funds totalled £86,780, of which the General Fund amounted to £29,037.

Income

The overall income was £604 (0.4%) higher than in 2023.

Donations received show a reduction of £3,340 (3%) from 2023. Contributing to this reduction, the regular giving shows a 6% fall in 2024.

Gift Aid Tax refunds show a reduction of £623 (3.5%) from 2023.

Income from other **Charitable Activities** (£42,556) show a 10% increase from the 2023 figure of £38,652. Greater income from **Weddings and Funerals** (+£1,340) and from **Fundraising Activities** (+£1,891) contributed to this significant increase. **Hall Lets Income** (£22,523) shows a 2.5% increase from 2023, sustaining and marginally improving a good level of income.

Expenditure

The overall expenditure was £137,410, 9.8% lower than in 2023. The 'Giving to Grow' allocation shows a significant reduction due to the vacancy allowance throughout 2024 (£9,321). Salaries were controlled to £663 (2.3%) less than in 2023 despite the usual increases. All Building costs, including repairs and replacements, were controlled to 15.6% lower than in 2023 (£4,195). Gas and Electricity costs have shown a 21% rise in 2024 and continue to be arranged through the General Trustees Energy Scheme.

It is the Trustees Policy to achieve reserves of approximately four months expenditure. At the year end the church had £29,037 in reserve (excluding funds held for Fabric, the Organ and the GCH Boiler), against a budgeted requirement of £44,903.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

Risk Management

Income from congregational giving continues to suffer from a steady decline year on year.

Expenditure on maintenance of buildings is reasonably in line with the Quinquennial requirements. There were no Fabric Projects in 2024 and nothing is planned for 2025.

The financial reserves in the Fabric Fund were not depleted in 2024 and retain enough to fund planned work in 2025.

Future Plans and Goals

At the beginning of 2023 the parishes of Currie and Balerno were classed as being in a Deferred Union as each had a full time Minister of Word and Sacrament with full tenure. With the departure of Rev Dr Easter Smart work began on working towards a formal Union between the two parishes and the setting up of a new parish. Negotiations are ongoing. An agreement was reached to the sale of Currie Manse. As of 1 December 2024 a decision was made by Presbytery that Currie and Balerno would move forward in a linkage. It is hoped that an Interim Minister will soon be appointed to work with the two parishes. This is seen as a stepping stone towards a formal Union.

We aim to further support the outreach to the Young through support and recruitment for The Boys' Brigade 65th Company.

To continue to grow our partnerships and chaplaincy at Heriot Watt University, Currie High School and the two primary schools; the Community Food Project; and the local Food Bank and Fresh Start.

Property

No major projects are visualised in 2025.

Structure, governance and management

The Congregation is a registered charity, number SC001554, and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deeds of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF EDINBURGH CURRIE KIRK

I report on the financial statements of the Church for the year ended 31 December 2024, which are set out on pages 9 to 23.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the Accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 ('the 2005 Act') and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) ('the 2006 Regulations'). 1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)". The church is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds, endowment funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

1.3 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount measured reliably.

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.4 Tangible fixed assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the church and manse, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

The Gibson Craig Memorial Hall is owned by the Kirk Session, as trustees, and is therefore included in the balance sheet at cost to the trustees.

1.5 Taxation

Currie Kirk is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

1.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.
