Bible Reading—2 Timothy 1: 5-7

I have been reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline.

Meditation—Heather

Today is about you

Isn't it incredible that God puts people into our lives to help, support and encourage us? As well as it being Mother's Day today, on Monday it was International Woman's Day, so today we especially want to think about the women God has placed in our lives. Not only those we call "mum", but any woman who has made a difference to our lives in a positive way. They might be mothers, grandmothers, teachers, family members, friends, members of our church, leaders. Those women who have shown love to us and are people we can depend on. Who is important to you?

In the video we just saw there were many Biblical women mentioned, some whose stories you may know well and others perhaps not. Maybe later you want to re-watch the video then read those stories in your Bible. I wonder which one stood out for you.

For me it was Lois and Eunice. The grandmother and mother of a young man called Timothy. In 2 Timothy 1:5-7 we read about them. Paul writes to Timothy saying:



"I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also."

Not only did Lois and Eunice have a strong faith of their own, but they eagerly passed it on to their children, grandchildren and family that they might know, follow and trust in God too. The importance of their motherly role was to nurture and grow faith in God in their children.

This past year we've had to do, almost that, church from home and explore the Bible together as families, it strikes me that this is what it was like for Lois, Eunice and Timothy all the time, and what it should be like for us. We should be eagerly talking about the Bible and God and living God's way in our homes and in front of our families for them to see and learn from each other. Not expecting it to always be other people who teach our children and our family, even ourselves about God, but we ourselves should be learning to walk with God together, as a family.

It reminds me of those verses in Deuteronomy 6:5-9:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates."

Why is it important to do these things? Because following God is the greatest, one of the most challenging and the most important thing we should do, and we need to help each other. We spend a lot of our time with our families, not only when we're in lockdown, but also during restriction free living. One of the key places we should be living out our faith is at home – learning together and from each other what it means to follow God. And so, we give thanks for women like Lois and Eunice in our homes who teach us how to follow God day by day.

But even for those who live alone, or aren't in contact with other family members, they can still have an impact on others for God. Think about some of the other women mentioned in the video: Anna, an old woman who had lived for a long time without her husband, who never left the Temple but was a witness there of what it means to live dedicated to God and encouraging people with words of hope about what God was doing. How many people did she impact through her life of faithfulness?

Or the midwives of Israel who were unafraid to go against the word of the most powerful human being in their land. They knew God to be more powerful than Pharaoh and so even though it put their lives in danger, they were willing to risk that for the advance of God's kingdom. How many children did they save and inspire with their courage?

Or Naomi, who adopted Ruth, Boaz and their baby into her family, who spoke words of blessing over them and taught them the ways of God. What would have happened if she had continued to push Ruth away instead of welcoming her?

Who are the women in your life who have been like those Biblical women? Who are the ones who taught you about God, showed you how to live life following Him? Who stood with you in the difficult times and helped you through? Who reminded you of God's promises and taught you the Bible? Who welcomed you in and loved you deeply and unconditionally?

How can you thank those people? Have you thanked God for those women?

Think about who cares for you, how do they do it, how do they care for you? And why, why do they care for you? Is it because they are showing off, is it because they want to look good in front of other people, is it because they will be rewarded for it? No, it's because they love you. And for Christians it's because they love God and want to imitate God and demonstrate His love to those around them.

Throughout the Bible we see God's love demonstrated—he provides for His people, protects them, rescues them, leads them. We see the ultimate act of love demonstrated through Jesus and the sacrifice he made on the cross.

Before Jesus was arrested and went to the cross, he spoke to his disciples, giving them some final encouragements and instructions. In John 15:12-17 we read some of these words:

“My command is this: Love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no-one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command. I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—fruit that will last—and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. This is my command: Love each other.”

So while we see God's love in action by how he interacts with people and through Jesus, we also see God's love demonstrated through people who live trying to imitate God. We see it through the human characters God chose to be His witnesses, His light to the world. Through people who know their purpose is to know God and make Him known.

Jesus doesn't ask us to do difficult things, he doesn't require us to complete impossible tasks or jump through hoops before he'll accept us and love us. Instead, he asks simple things—trust, faith, love. Not that those things are always easy, but then we have the gift of God's presence, the Holy Spirit in us to help us do the things we find difficult. God's calling to us is simple, know Him and imitate Him.

When I think about the women who have and are making an impact on my life, what I see reflected in them is God's heart. They don't expect or require impossible things from me before they'll love me or help me. Instead, they look at me and see my worth as a person, as a child of God, accepted first by Him, freely welcomed by Him and so freely welcomed and loved by them. What I see when I look at them is the image of God.

God has chosen each one of us to be part of His family. He places people in our lives to love us, encourage us and support us. He also gives us people we can love, encourage and support. Whether in our families, our church, the work we do or volunteering we take part in, in our friendships God gives us people that we can show His love to. So perhaps today or this week you want to take time to thank God for the people he has placed in your life, maybe if you're able you can thank the person themselves. But also ask God to show you who he wants you to reach out to with His love.

Lenten Appeal for Leprosarium

Isn't it a small world? After our initial request two weeks ago for donations for St Luke's Leprosarium in South India, we received an email from former Currie Kirk member, Colin Sharp, in Rothesay, who is still sent our Sunday services pdf.

He had seen the mention of St Luke's and said that he and his wife first became interested in the hospital after hearing Gordon MacKinlay talk about it in Currie Kirk after his visit there in 2003. They have continued to support the leprosarium ever since and visited themselves in 2007. He forwarded us the report below which they had been sent last month about a patient in one of the beds they support.

We did dressings regularly. He was having chronic back pain. We diagnosed lumbar spine compression. Now he is on regular traction. He is working as a ward-boy in our leprosarium. He is helping the disabled patients in the ward. He is doing well. He likes it here. We gave him special gifts during our Christmas function. We thank you once again for helping us take care of him."
